CHRISTIAN FEDDERSEN

Christian Feddersen was born July 1st 1849 at Overby Slesvig, Denmark, and died at his home in Marquette, September 5th, 1927, attaining the age of 78 years, 2 months and 4 days. He was confirmed in the Lutheran church of Distrup Slesvig at the age of 15. He and his mother were charter members of the St. John's Lutheran church east of Marquette of which church he was a member at the time of his death.

He came to America in the fall of 1867 locating at Dwight, Illinois. He united in marriage with Miss Anna Solbeck of Dwight, Illinois May 2nd, 1873. To this union three sons and four daughters were born. In 1878

Mr. and Mrs. Feddersen came to Nebraska over what is known today as the "covered wagon route". They located in Hamilton county where they made their home until 1917 when they moved to Marquette to spend their declining days. Out on the frontier of our American life, struggling with numerous hardships and adversities, these pioneer people acquired the fundamental qualities that have made our nation what it is today.

Mr. Feddersen leaves to mourn his departure, one sister, Mrs. Anna Pearson, of Burwell, Nebraska, two sons, Louis of Dannebrog and Christian of Marquette; four daughters, Mrs. Dr. J. Jensen of Cedar Falls, Iowa, Mrs. Carl Gjerloff of Marquette, Mrs. Chas. Coon of Fruitland, Idaho, Mrs. Ivan Neble of Marquette, 20 grandchildren and a large group of friends. Mrs. Feddersen passed away from this life in 1919 and a son Otto in 1920.

In his daily life Mr. Feddersen was simple and plain, devoid of artifice or ostentation. Unusually blessed in his domestic relations, he found his happiest hours in his garden, among his flowers and with the loved ones of his household. During the last year of his life, his health gradually failed, but when he came to meet the inevitable hour he met it with Christian fortitude and grace. Mr. Feddersen was a kind and friendly man and will be missed by all who know him.

Services were held from the home at 2:00 p. m. Thursday afternoon, and at 2:30 p. m. from St. John's Lutheran church at Kronborg, conducted by Rev. Holger Strandskov of the Lutheran church and Rev. W. S. Henry, Pastor of the United Brethren church at Marquette.

Mrs. C. S. Gjerloff of Mar-
quette, received a message tell-
ing of the death of her aunt,
Mrs. A. S. Hansen at Cedar Falls,
Iowa, last Saturday, at the age
of 80 years.

A few of the early settlers
will remember Mrs. Hansen as
Marie Solbeck, who, born in Sles-
vig, Denmark, came to Aurora
in 1878. For several years she
clerked in a pioneer store operat-
ed on the northeast corner of
the square by John Rabben. On
December 12, 1884, she was mar-
ried to Rev. A. S. Hansen and
they later moved to Omaha where
Rev. Hansen held the pastorate
of the Danish Lutheran church
for a few years. In 1890 they
moved to Cedar Falls, Iowa,
where they have since resided.
Mr. Hansen's death occurred 2
years ago. Surviving are two
sons, Hans and Thorvald, and
one daughter Laurentza, all of
Iowa. One son, Ernest, died in
